COMMODORE'S REPORT

It's been a busy time for the Board this year. We've had incredible growth in our membership, mainly through our training programs, but I believe that BYC has a genuine sense of being a community which is attractive to potential new members. BYC is a place where people who love boating can come together.

A highlight was when BYC were awarded 'Club of the Year'. This is voted on by our peers with criteria recognising strong membership growth, commitment to training excellence and our commitment to encourage and increase female participation.

Sai/BYC has been a success story with expanded offerings for sail training. I'm very pleased to see it grow with Vaughan Lynch taking over the management of this, initially as a volunteer and now through his role as our Operations Manager. He has improved Sai/BYC by bringing fresh new ideas and direction. I'm especially pleased that we now have a large team of instructors which will allow us to grow even further, and we have some new courses coming up.

BYC has been the leader in supporting Australian Sailing's "SheSails" initiative which provides opportunities for women and girls to develop skills which we expect will reduce barriers and lead to increased participation. Supporting She Sails BYC is a priority for the Board.

The decision to remove the billiard tables was not taken lightly and I recognise that some members were disappointed. With a growing membership of around 12% it became clear that many members could not access the restaurant which was often fully booked. We also needed space to accommodate an increasing need for a training area. This has given us more room as overflow for the restaurant, a small area for private functions and has all of the electronic aids needed for conferences and training. It provides significant revenue and reduces the manpower needed to continually reconfigure the restaurants for functions which we can reinvest the income by providing better services and facilities for our members.

On my bucket list is to improve disabled access. We need substantial funding to build a lift giving our frail or disabled members access to upstairs from the carpark.

The appointment of an Operations Manager has allowed us to have a good look at improving efficiencies with staffing. We expect that some roles will subtly change, but with greater flexibility we can manage absences and staff working from home due to COVID or other family needs.

The transition to Xero and Marina Master has been a massive undertaking and I'd like to thank Danny and the Finance Committee, office and staff. We've taken a lot of advice from accountants on how our charter of accounts should be set up, and had our books checked independently each month. This has saved us a lot in audit fees and because Xero is cloud based our accountants and advisors can access remotely which is a significant advantage from its predecessor.

The opening up of Tasmanian borders on 15 December had an immediate effect on the patronage levels. As soon as Omicron started spreading, we had less than 20% of members using the Club and just about every function for Jan and Feb was cancelled. Management decided to trial relocating to the Marina Bar and with outdoor seating and terrific weather offered a lot more space for patrons. We've been monitoring the income and at this stage it is more than supporting itself financially. The challenge will be to maintain this during the cooler months but so far so good.

The Marina project has been our largest infrastructure project ever. Richard Gilbert has been instrumental in guiding us through complex negotiations, but others have

contributed in a big way. The acquisition or moving of moorings and the Marina Allocation Project both consumed a lot of time running surveys and listening to feedback. The Marina lease contract was completely updated. This was a major task as indemnity and governance are big things these days. The overarching goal for the Board was for the documents to be transparent and the terms be fair and equitable to all parties.

Finally, I'd like to thank the Board for their time and service to our Club. It often feels like a thankless task and involves making tough decisions when needed. Having said this, the advice, constructive feedback and support meant a lot to me and I'd like to thank those for their passion and interest into improving our club. Just as important is to recognise our volunteers who also give up their time to perform tasks such as the Wednesday Warriors. Others jump on our training boat to assist our instructors to run courses and help make an introduction to sailing enjoyable and hopefully addictive. Some volunteer for start boxes, start boats and patrol boats. We are very strong in being a Club which people enjoy using and seeing it prosper and on behalf of the Board I'd like to thank them.

Thanks to our office and management staff. It's a hard gig when you have a flood of members with differing opinions on how things should be done. Managing conflicting needs is an exercise of controlling chaos and their patience and professionalism is greatly appreciated.

I'd also like to thank Ian Marshall for his service as Vice Commodore over the past four years. He's been terrific in assisting me with the background on some issues which I wasn't privy to as a normal Board member and is always open and honest when running a new idea past him. Ian has decided to take a break and not stand this year, but I know he'll still be keen to assist, and I'm sure I will still be able to draw on his experience when I need it.

We expect that the Marina will be completed by mid-September. This will be an exciting time as we'll add around 50 new boats to our Club. Extra boats and members mean we can start planning new sailing events and activities and no doubt in order to accommodate growth we'll need to have a good look at the clubhouse itself. Big picture stuff but every journey starts with a footstep.

MARINA REDEVELOPMENT FINANCIAL STATEMENT

As of the 30 April 2022 the Club has expended from initial concept to current \$1,445,249, being \$1,179,262 from Club funds and \$265,987 from the CBA loan of \$4,000,000.

Due to the delayed start from the time of pricing and the volatility of the world market in relation to material and shipping costs, this has added approximately \$260,000 in costs.

MARINA REDEVELOPMENT PROGRESS REPORT

As of the first of May, we will be approximately 35% of the way through the programmed works. We have encountered significant difficulties with the piling in Arm A1 resulting in a two week delay to the original program. This was due to encountering hard rock which did not allow the piles to be spun. As a consequence we had to go to a alternative piling method called "Down the Hole Drilling", resulting in a 60k variation to the contract contingence funds allocation.

To date we have completed the following works:

- Piling and pontoon installation to the Fuel Berth
- Piling and pontoon installation to Arm A1
- Piling and pontoon installation to the Tee Heads to Arm A3 and B
- Piling to the outer section of Arm A2 (nine piles)
- Demolition to the existing sea wall
- Trenching for conduits from the main switch board to the boardwalk for new power and comms supply

We have also engaged the relevant contractors and suppliers for the land side works as below:

- Fuel facility supply and installation Northern Fuel
- Civil works and trenching Moore Civil
- Power supply to the distribution boards of each arm RBD Electrical
- Water and fire main supply to each arm Express Plumbing

There will be significantly restricted access to most of the Marina in the later part of the works as the existing marina gets demolished and before full access to the new arms is completed. I would like to thank in advance our members for being understanding and patient through this stage. We will endeavour to keep the restricted access to a minimum and ask all members to only enter the works area if completely essential.

We are currently on date for completion mid-September at which time we will have a modern and relatively maintenance-free infrastructure for many years to come.

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

Board and Membership

This year was the first term as Commodore for Jeff Cordell, who had been a board member for three years prior. Wayne Freeman was elected as Rear Commodore with lan Marshall as Vice Commodore, halfway through his two year term. There were five new Life Members appointed – Ian and Penny Stewart; father and son George and Richard Gilbert plus John Mills. Last year's Club Member of the Year was Fiona Harvey, and Crew Member of the Year Kate Legge handed over these honours to David Paine (Club Member of the Year 2022) and Troy Grafton (Crew Member of the Year 2022).

New Marina

One of the first tasks for the new Commodore was signing the contract with Bellingham Australia for the new Marina. Finally, the board and members could see that the project was going to begin.

The highlight for the year was the driving of the first pile of the \$4M marina development project in mid January.



This was a result of nearly nine years work, at lot done by previous boards, but spearheaded by newly appointed Life member, Richard Gilbert. The capacity of the Marina was originally planned to increase from 167 to 222 marina berths. The State Government had launched a Trans-Derwent initiative and expressed concerns that if the southernmost piles were driven it would hinder access for the new ferry service. After some good faith negotiations, BYC agreed to a redesign which meant the loss of 13 berths and BYC is now negotiating how to restore the lost capacity elsewhere.

Australian Sailing Award

This year the BYC was awarded Australian Sailing's Tasmanian Club of the Year. This was voted on by our peers, and the 12% growth in membership, success in growing

our training offering and our commitment to the SheSails initiative were factors that were mentioned at the awards night.

Kangaroo Bay Development

A few years ago the old ferry terminal was acquired by Shambroad International who had plans to redevelop the site into an international hospitality training facility. The demolishment of the terminal meant that BYC no longer had a fueling facility, nor storage for dinghies. As part of a grant deed, a new facility for dinghy storage and a fueling facility adjacent to the slipway was awarded by the government and the works were completed.

The new seawall, which extends out from the southern side of Kangaroo Bay was finally finished after nearly a year of construction. This dramatically deadened the swell within the marina.

SailBYC

The Sai/BYC training initiative continued to grow. With Jeff Cordell undertaking Commodore duties, Vaughan Lynch stepped up as the centre principal, with a lot of new ideas which included working with colleges and providing an opportunity to sail for children with special needs. There was a need for more instructors with Barry Bruce, Pete Pickett and Lucy Rees becoming qualified. Kenn Batt was awarded an honorary membership for his assistance and generosity in running a very popular weather course.

Billiard Tables

The removal of the billiard tables was a controversial decision for the board to make. The Club had grown in size and members were finding it hard to use the restaurant unless booking well ahead. BYC had a growing need for a space for training and our members were commenting that the Club was too crowded at times. The new area had an unexpected windfall though. On 8 January 2022 a severe rain deluge and an unusually high tide meant the stormwater at the end of Percy Street couldn't cope,

flooding out the doctors' clinic and the pharmacy. Blundstone Arena, which was about to host the fifth Ashes test was completely underwater. BYC was able to assist by making this new space and the boardroom available to the pharmacy, allowing them to continue with COVID-19 vaccinations. The area is now hired to a variety of clients for private functions as well as a space for sail training.

COVID-19

TAS quarantine borders were lifted on the 15 December 2021 and it didn't take long for the Omicron variant to spread through the community. This had a drastic effect on the Club with attendance at members nights as well as Thursday and Fridays evenings dropping to about 20% of normal levels. Every function in the week before new year, as well as January and February were cancelled. Our famous New Year's Eve event dropped from close to 500 down to 250. Management decided to close upstairs and focus on running the Marina Bar seven days per week. This gave the members more space including an outdoor option to socially distance and thanks to some terrific weather the members started to return along with some new patronage from the public, meaning that BYC was able to avoid having to shutdown services that members normally enjoyed.

Community



BYC was part of a fundraiser for people affected by the Hillcrest Primary School accident. This was a Combined Clubs venture joining with the RYCT and DSS for a special twilight race on 14 January 2022. All entry fees were donated to the appeal together with additional fund raising at all the clubs taking part with BYC managing to raise \$2247.00.

Crown Series

Crown Series (18–20 February 2022) had close to 100 entries. The weather was consistent, and some great racing occurred. Division 1 (13 boats) had a hard-fought short course race, including a hotly contested race within a race with five mumm36's fighting it out. There was good attendance within the 'performance cruising' divisions (43 boats). BYC also hosted the SB20 state titles and the off the beach events were run by western shore clubs which assisted with social distancing requirements.

TREASURER'S FINANCE REPORT

2021–22 has been an eventful year with many challenges within the Club's operations which have impacted the Club's finances. In particular food and beverage has performed poorly and cost of goods and wages have exceeded the budgets set, while lower member spends and COVID related cancellations of functions have all impacted.

This year the Club has not received COVID relief funding and has had to make some changes to the operational model to provide a platform which minimises the reliance on the marina berthing fees for general purposes.

The Club has recorded a post depreciation loss of \$91k. Food and beverage and \$50k in staff payouts were major contributors. Depreciation being \$174k.

There have been some good financial news stories, including the repurposing of the pool room to a function room which has posted \$13,000 profit in the short time it has been operational. *Sail*BYC has exceeded the budget projections and has provided many new members to the Club.

The Marina Bar, whilst a work in progress, has increased member services and has been steadily increasing in trade, which is a positive outcome. Manager Scott Steedman has negotiated a \$45k cash contribution from Boags to upgrade the Marina Bar.

Our premier regatta, the Crown Series was a resounding success.

Changing the Club's accounting platform to Xero is complete and the operational platform for all other aspects of the Club's operation – Marina Master – went live mid-May and will better enable monitoring of all areas of the Club's operation.

We have been successful in gaining a small grant towards a disabled lifter on the Marina which will be an asset for the Club's inclusion policy and safety of our members.

The Club's balance sheet is in good shape, with a revaluation of the Marina and Club's assets pending. Changing accounting platforms will necessitate a full review of all assets/depreciation schedules.

Next year's budget has been set and approved by the Board and we all look forward to a new Marina in full operation.

The Club is nothing without members who contribute their time for our benefit; from sailing to our Wednesday warriors and those who give up time to sit on committees. I thank you all. In particular – Life Member Lindsay McDougall who has assisted the finance committee with the Club's asset register and depreciation schedule, and Richard Gilbert for his tireless efforts on the Marina redevelopment. Lastly, I thank fellow finance committee members Glenn Frame and James Shevlin for this year.

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements have been prepared on the basis that the association is a non-reporting entity because there are no users dependent on general purpose financial statements. These financial statements are therefore special purpose financial statements that have been prepared in order to meet the requirements of the *Associations Incorporation Act 1964 (Tas)*. The association is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

b) Other Liabilities

Other Liabilities includes sundry amounts held by the Bellerive Yacht Club that may be payable to external people or organisations. For example the Bellerive Regatta Association – should it be reconvened at some future date.

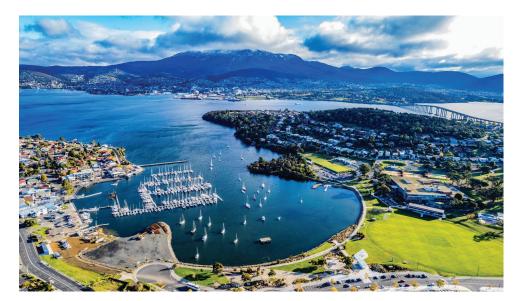

Report on the Audit of the Financial Report

Qualified Opinion

We have audited the financial report of Bellerive Yacht Club Inc (the association), which comprises the Statement by Members of the Committee, the Income and Expenditure Statement, Balance Sheet as at 30 April 2022, a summary of significant accounting policies and the certification by members of the committee on the annual statements giving a true and fair view of the financial position and performance of the association.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial report presents fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the association as at 30 April 2022 and [of] its financial performance for the year then ended in accordance with the accounting policies described in Note 1 to the financial statements and the requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1964.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In our review of the Association we note per the previous Audit Report, and in the current Audit Report year there have been significant ongoing changes to the staff and systems during 2020–21 and 2021–22 years. As a result the ability to be provided with full details and substantiation somewhat compromises this years audit. As previously established Cash Income is a significant source of revenue for Bellerive Yacht Club Inc. The Bellerive Yacht Club Inc has determined that it is impracticable to establish control over the collection of cash income prior to entry into its financial records. Accordingly, as evidence available to us this year was limited, our audit procedures were restricted to the amounts recorded in the financial records. We therefore are unable to express an opinion on whether the recorded income of Bellerive Yacht Club Inc is complete.

New Marina Project: We further raise commentary in regards to the ongoing development of the New Marina project and note given the large loan funds incurred for this project. Bellerive Yacht Club Inc has relied on the projected Cash Flows Reports prepared and reviewed by BDO in August 2020. The Bellerive Yacht Club Inc based on this special cash flow report has deemed it will have sufficient future incomes to satisfy the project loan commitments. While we have reviewed the cash flow for reasonableness, we have not audited this report and it is the committee's responsibility for the information contained in this report.

We conducted our audit in accordance with Australian Auditing Standards. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Report section of our report. We are independent of the association in accordance with the ethical requirements of the Accounting Professional and Ethical Standards Board's APES 110 Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants (the Code) that are relevant to our audit of the financial report in Australia. We have also fulfilled our ethical responsibilities in accordance with the Code.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 to the financial report, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial report has been prepared to assist the association to meet the requirements of Associations Incorporation Act 1964. As a result, the financial report may not be suitable for another purpose. Our opinion is not modified in respect of this matter.

Responsibilities of the Committee for the Financial Report
